

The New Covenant

Today's first reading is an enormously important passage, not only in the history of the Jewish people, but also for us as disciples of Jesus, who see in it a foreshadowing of the Christian dispensation. The prophet announces that God has chosen to forgive the people, and that as a sign of divine forgiveness a new covenant will be established. Contrasting the new covenant with the one made with Moses on Mount Sinai, Jeremiah says that the new covenant will be written on the people's hearts rather than on tablets of stone. No longer will the community's tradition be the sole bearer of the covenant; henceforth, God will speak directly and personally to each individual, forgiving sin and calling for a return to God in faithfulness. No longer will mere outward compliance with the dictates of the Law suffice; henceforth, God asks for an obedience that springs from the depths of one's heart.

Precisely that kind of obedience is highlighted in today's second reading, where the author of the Letter to the Hebrews describes Jesus as the mediator of the new covenant whose obedience has made him the source of salvation for all who, in turn, obey him.

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Feast of Faith

The First Reading

Each Sunday, we listen to three scripture readings. The first reading usually comes from the Old Testament. "The New Testament lies hidden in the Old; the Old Testament comes fully to light in the New," we read in the *Introduction to the Lectionary*. "Christ himself is the center and fullness of the whole of Scripture" (5). On Sundays, these readings usually have a close connection to the Gospel. In this season of Lent, for example, the Exodus account of the thirst of the Israelites in the desert is paired with the Samaritan woman's encounter with Jesus at the well. Ezekiel's vision of the Lord raising people from their graves is paired with the narrative of Christ raising Lazarus from the dead.

The readings are taken from many sources—historical books like Judges, Kings and the Acts of the Apostles, prophets like Isaiah and Ezekiel, wisdom literature like Proverbs or Ecclesiastes. But no matter its genre, the first reading always ends with the same acclamation: "The word of the Lord." The scriptures are written by human authors who wrote in widely different cultural and historical contexts, but these human authors are also divine instruments through whom God speaks to us. And so we say, "Thanks be to God."

He Made His Dwelling Among Us

The Annunciation and the Gospel of Life

The Annunciation celebrates the visit of the angel Gabriel to the Virgin Mary to inform her that she was to be the mother of Jesus. On this great feast day, we not only recall Mary's courageous "yes" to God, we also celebrate the

Incarnation of Christ, our Savior. For it was there, in the womb of a woman, nine months before the celebration of the manger, that "the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us" (John 1:14).

The celebration of the Annunciation coincides with the anniversary of the papal encyclical *Evangelium vitae* (*The Gospel of Life*). This prophetic document on the dignity and inviolability of every human life was put forth by Pope John Paul II on the Solemnity of the Annunciation in 1995. The intimate connection of these two events highlights a profound reality about the identity and value of every human person.

Luke's Gospel tells us that by the power of the Holy Spirit, Christ would be conceived within the womb of Mary. It was there, in the womb of the Blessed Mother, that Christ first took on human flesh and made his dwelling among us. Like us, the unborn child Jesus grew and developed beneath the shelter of his mother's loving heart. Through Christ's Incarnation, God chose to share fully and intimately in our humanity and bridge all distance between God and man, so that we may dwell together.

The Church teaches us that "by His incarnation the Son of God has united Himself in some fashion with every man." God desired to dwell among

us, as one of us, in order to bring us salvation. This truth "reveals to humanity not only the boundless love of God...but also the incomparable value of every human person."²


Each of us is made in the image and likeness of our Creator, to share in the very life of God himself. This reality "reveals the greatness and the inestimable value of human life." The human person is "a manifestation of God in the world, a sign of his presence, a trace of his glory." Created through the love of the Father, each one of us bears "an indelible imprint of God." By sharing in our humanity, Christ invites us to share in his divinity, that we might dwell with him for eternity.

Therefore, "the Gospel of God's love for man, the Gospel of the dignity of the person and the Gospel of life are a single and indivisible Gospel." 6

Through Christ's descent to earth God desires to raise each one of us to the heights of heaven. May we recognize that to proclaim the Gospel of Life is to proclaim Christ, the one who *made his dwelling among us*.

Letting Go to Follow Christ

In a Nutshell

Jesus calls us to put God first, above everyone and everything else. And that's really the point of the virtue we call "detachment."

Detachment is the opposite of attachment. If we get too attached to someone or something, we cannot let that person or object go, even when such letting go is necessary.

We must be detached enough from other people and possessions, Jesus insists, that they cannot interfere with following God's will.

Becoming Detached from Our Everyday Activities

Peter and Andrew were businessmen. So were their neighbors James and John. They tried to wring a living out of the Sea of Galilee, and it probably took nearly all of the time and energy that they had.

So it would have been easy to pass on the chance to hear some new prophet proclaim that the kingdom of God had finally arrived. And then, having heard this message, they could have rolled their eyes and chuckled about how they hoped that this kingdom would put more fish in the lake.

Or they could have made excuses that this was all very interesting but following the wandering rabbi from Nazareth was more suitable for single men with no mouths to feed.

No, when Jesus invited them to learn to catch men instead of fish (Mk 1:14-20), they dropped their nets, abandoned their businesses and went on the road.

Is it wrong to have a family? Is it wrong to be in business? Are these secular activities inappropriate for a disciple of Jesus? Not in the least. The church teaches that we can serve the Lord and grow in holiness through any honest task, whether we are single or married. But St. Paul also tells us that the Christian engaged in secular activities must inwardly detach from them: "Let those having wives act as not having them ... those buying as not owning, those using the world as not using it fully. For the world in its present form is passing away" (1 Cor 7:29-31).

The word "secular" means "of this world." Now it is true that God likes this world. After all, he created it. But when sinful humanity gets ahold of the things of this passing world, it doesn't want to let go. It becomes engrossed, absorbed, consumed with them, to the neglect of what lasts forever, namely the kingdom of God.

In Jesus, the kingdom has touched down on planet Earth. We need to reform our lives, which is not only to say repent from sin, but actually structure our lives totally around the kingdom and its priorities.

Kingdom priorities might dictate that many enter into the sacrament of matrimony in order to raise up new heralds of the kingdom and leaders of God's people. And Christ may call others to involve themselves in business so as to provide financially for God's work and to infuse Christian values into the marketplace.

Detachment does not mean that you shouldn't enjoy your secular pursuits and approach them with energy and enthusiasm. It just means that your daily activity must be placed on the altar, offered up to God as a living sacrifice.

And you must be ever ready to walk away from your activities at a moment's notice, should Jesus call you to do so. Moments of truth will come to test just how serious we are about living for God rather than for sports, careers and even families. Yes families. There are times when duty calls soldiers to leave their families. The same holds true for breadwinners -- my great grandfather left family behind in Italy for several years while he prepared a better place for them in America. So why should we be surprised that at times some may be called

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to leave family for the sake of the kingdom of God?

We may not be called literally to leave all behind to walk the dusty trails of Israel. But there will come a moment when we may hear an invitation to decline a scholarship, or a promotion, or a romance for the sake of the kingdom.

As the Gospel story unfolds, we learn that the apostles had more than a few shortcomings. But we have to admit this -- that when that initial call came, as challenging as it was, they made no excuses. Can the same be said for us?

Even before her death in 1938, the devotion to The Divine Mercy had begun to spread. The message of mercy is that God loves us—all of us—no matter how great our sins. He wants us to recognize that his mercy is greater than our sins, so that we will call upon him with trust, receive his mercy and let it flow through us to others.



Saint of the Week

Saint Basil the Younger Died Circa 952 Feast Day: March 26

As a young man, Basil began living as a hermit near Con-

stantinople, now Istanbul, Turkey. Courtiers of the Byzantine emperor, alarmed at his appearance and fearful of his influence, had him arrested and questioned as a spy. Basil would say only that he was a pilgrim and stranger on earth, but he denounced their immoral lifestyles. According to his hagiography, he survived their cruel tortures and being thrown to a lion unharmed, and was saved from an official drowning by two dolphins. These miracles won him freedom. Thereafter, many of the faithful came to his hermitage for healing, prophecies and instruction. Basil reportedly lived to the age of 110.

Almsgiving: An Expression of Gratitude

When we look at the three traditional "disciplines" of Lent, prayer, fasting and almsgiving, we know that almsgiving gets the least attention. Yet, the Bible places emphasis firmly on almsgiving: "Prayer and fasting are good, but better than either is almsgiving accompanied by righteousness ... It is better to give alms than to store up gold; for almsgiving saves one from death and expiates every sin. Those who regularly give alms shall enjoy a full life" (Tobit 12:8-9).

Almsgiving is simply an expression of our gratitude for all that God has given us, and a realization that as a member of a community of faith, it is never just "me and God." For disciples of the Lord, almsgiving means much more than simply throwing a little change in the poor box. It is part of cultivating an attitude of generosity. It challenges us to examine how we are using our time, abilities and money to better the lives of those around us. It urges us to share what we have been given by God with others in love and justice. It reminds us that Jesus blesses those who seek to be "poor in spirit" (Matt. 5:3).

Almsgiving opens our hearts to the realization that God blesses us through those we serve. It is here that we find the great mystery of Christian service. We see God in the life of Jesus, and we see Jesus in all those who are in need of our care. It is especially during these uncertain times that we can look around, see those who are in need and ask God to take away those obstacles and distractions that keep us from being generous with them. In turn, we will receive Christ's blessing, a blessing we need to receive.

Almsgiving ideas for Lent as is appropriate and safe during this time of pandemic:

- Show an act of kindness to someone you don't speak to often.
- Reach out to an elderly person who may be lonely.
- Reflect on the regular contributions you make to the parish. Could you do more?

- Do an extra chore for your parents one day each week during Lent. Go through your closet and find some clothes in good shape and offer them to a clothing bank or homeless shelter in your area.
- Write a letter or create a card for someone who is sick or might be lonely.
- Buy some cans of food to give to a food bank or soup kitchen.
- Talk with your family about eating one simple meal each week of Lent and offering the money you save for an organization that serves the poor such as Catholic Charities.
- Volunteer to clean the yard or wash windows for an elderly person in your neighborhood.
- Prepare a meal or baked goods for the soup kitchen or homeless shelter.
- Make a gift to the diocesan annual appeal.
- Volunteer to read books and magazines to the elderly.
- Donate diapers, formula, baby clothing, baby furniture and maternity clothing to a local crisis pregnancy center.



Lenten Observances

The dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass has been extended through Easter Sunday, of the Resurrection of the Lord, April 4, 2021.

Fasting

In the dioceses in the United States, Catholics aged 18 through 59 are bound to fast on both Ash Wednesday (February 17) and Good Friday (April 2). To fast means to consume one full meal a day at most, although taking of other, smaller

quantities of food at the other customary mealtimes is permitted. Food and drink between meals (excepting water and medicine) is not permitted on fast days.

Abstinence from Meat

Catholics aged 14 and up are to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, all Fridays of Lent and Good Friday. To abstain means refraining from eating beef, veal, pork or poultry at least, although eggs and milk products are acceptable. The consumption of fish and shellfish is permitted, though the penitential character of the abstinence should be kept in mind.

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
